7. Steel impact-resistant buffer band behind cladding
8. Suspended metal ceiling tiles

'In replacing the ceiling above Europe's largest ticket gate line, we specified bespoke ceiling panels finished in anti-graffiti paint. Designed to be fixed from behind for security, certain panels have a lock system to allow for access and maintenance.
